Envision Hilton 2030

Investing in the future of the Hilton Community and it's Residents

Mayor Joe Lee and the Village Board of Trustees are pleased to announce the development of a new comprehensive plan for the Hilton community. The plan, in its beginning stages, has been entitled “Envision Hilton 2030” and will serve as the new guiding document for the future of the Village.

A comprehensive plan is a statement of community goals and a conceptual road map for how to achieve them; providing guidance to municipal leaders, government agencies, community organizations, local businesses and residents, while helping to ensure the needs of the community are met in the present and in the future.

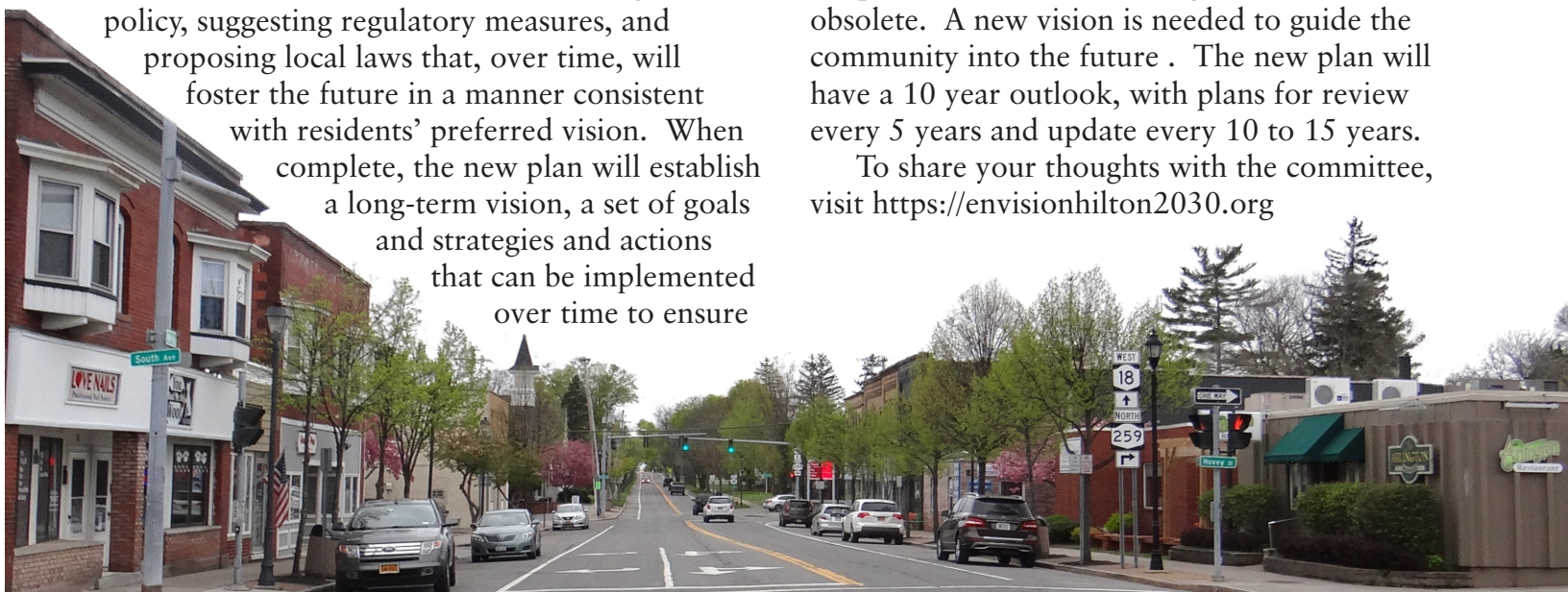
The new plan will address a wide variety of topics including infrastructure, economic development, smart growth, sustainability, the environment, housing, the business district and recreation, with consideration on drafting land use policy, suggesting regulatory measures, and proposing local laws that, over time, will foster the future in a manner consistent with residents’ preferred vision. When complete, the new plan will establish a long-term vision, a set of goals and strategies and actions that can be implemented over time to ensure

that Hilton retains its community character.

The year-long planning process to draft the new plan will be guided by a steering committee comprised of representatives from the local government including staff, board members, business representatives and residents from the community. The process will be facilitated by MRB Group, a Rochester based engineering, architecture, site development and municipal consulting firm, which specializes in comprehensive plans. Activities will include public workshops with design and planning sessions which provide community members the opportunity to “roll up their sleeves” and contribute to the conversation. The goal is to reach as many residents, business owners and other stakeholders as possible, in order to create a consensus for Hilton's future.

The comprehensive plan currently in use was adopted in 1977 and has long since become obsolete. A new vision is needed to guide the community into the future. The new plan will have a 10 year outlook, with plans for review every 5 years and update every 10 to 15 years.

Village of Hilton Designated A Clean Energy Community

The new designation will benefit the Village of Hilton by affording more opportunities to be awarded additional grant money to fund future clean energy projects, helping us to continue reducing our carbon footprint!

Following the March election, Shannon Zabelny was elected to serve as Trustee for the remainder of Craig Burritt's term through March 2020. Congratulations Shannon!

Shannon previously served one term as Trustee from 2014 to 2018, serving as Vice Mayor during that term. She also previously served on the Zoning Board of Appeals for 2 years. Shannon was uncontested in the election.

Shannon has lived in the village since 2008, with her husband of 42 years, Rob. They have 2 adult children, Kyle and Kara, who both live out of state with their families.

Shannon enjoys living in Hilton and participating in the many events sponsored by the Village. She is grateful to have another year to serve the residents of the Hilton community as Village Trustee.

To mention a few, he was instrumental in starting the Christmas Tree Lighting ceremony in 1992, a celebration still enjoyed, he helped keep the post office in a central location in the village, he assisted in the plans to construct Old Hojack Lane, and he collaborated to establish Hovey Square in the village plaza. Walt is an avid photographer and has shared many of his photos of village events with the community.

Hilton Village Budget 2019-20

On April 9, 2019 the Village Board adopted a new budget for the 2019-20 fiscal year, effective June 1, 2019. The good news is, this year's tax rate will be going down. The tax rate will decrease by 10 cents to the new rate of \$2.57 per \$1,000.

In the new budget, \$84,000 will be used for street maintenance. The Tallwood Drive and Peach Blossom sub-divisions are scheduled for crack filling and slurry sealing this year.

Residents can be pleased that the Village has received a \$58,000 HUD Community Development Grant to provide for sidewalk and gutter repair and replacement on Sunny Slope Drive.

Included in the Village's vehicle replacement plan, \$220,000 has been budgeted to purchase a new recycling truck. The new truck will be a smaller, less expensive, more efficient vehicle, set up for single stream recycling. An added benefit will be the truck's ability to compact a greater volume of recyclable materials with less air in the load. The new vehicle will replace a 19 year old, rusted out recycling truck. Also included in the vehicle replacement plan, \$49,000 has been budgeted to replace a 10 year old leaf machine. After replacement, the old leaf machine and recycling truck will be sold at auction and the money from the sales will go in a reserve savings fund to provide for the purchase of future replacement needs.

Now in its 5th year, the Village continues progress in upgrading the street lighting system to LED. This year, \$28,000 has been budgeted to replace 75 lights along Parkwood Lane, Park

Square, Fraser Drive, Tyler Trail, Cooper Drive, Short Hills Drive, Little Tree Lane, Sunny Slope Drive, Mockingbird Lane, Turtle Creek Drive and Dunbar Road. At completion, a total of 312 light heads will have been upgraded since 2015. Lighting upgrades will continue annually until the entire village is complete.

\$40,000 has been budgeted for on-going sanitary sewer improvements. The sewer mains on Grove Street, and Henry Street are scheduled to be slip lined.

Sewer rates will remain unchanged this year at \$150. Water rates will increase .10 cents from \$3.39 to \$3.49 per 1,000 gallons. The daily consumption rate of .21 cents will increase with the Monroe County rates by .01 cent to .22 cents.

\$16,000 has been budgeted to replace a 6 inch water meter for Village II. \$20,000 has also been budgeted to replace 10 fire hydrants that are older than 50 years.

Last year, the Village received a grant for \$225,154 from DASNY to expand and improve the Jennejahn Lodge. Work was supposed to take place in March, April and May of this year. Unfortunately bids for the project came in higher

than anticipated, so it was decided to push the job off until the spring of 2020 in hope that a re-bid, scheduled for December, will have better results. By waiting a year, accumulated savings will contribute to the finance of the project. The building will be closed for 3 months during the expansion from March, April and May of 2020, and will be unavailable for rental usage during that time.

Old Landmark Demolished

The old brick chimney at the east end of Hazen Street, and on the bank of Salmon Creek, has been demolished. The structure was deemed unsafe by new owners and was taken down.

The old chimney was known to many older residents, especially those who used to play around it in their youth. In recent years no one quite knew what it was used for.

After a bit of research in a book entitled, *"1877 History of Monroe County"*, it states, *"In 1874 Clark and Crary built a large steam sawmill, stave and barrel factory at Unionville"*, (Unionville was the original name for Hilton). Leith Wright also states in her book, *"Hilton U.S.A"*, that a stave and barrel factory was built on the banks of Salmon Creek in 1874 by Riley Clark and Nathan Crary. During my research I found that the chimney was used to exhaust smoke from a furnace that fired a boiler which created steam that in turn ran a sawmill and cooper shop. The operation changed hands over the years, with Willard Judd as owner of The Flouring Mill, followed by the Upton Company. In 1914 the operation was purchased by a group of stockholders organized by A.B. Fraser and Fred Zoller and incorporated as the Hilton Milling and Warehouse. The cooper shop was still in operation until the 1930s and the chimney was still in use, at that time as an exhaust to shape barrel staves and heat metal hoops. The barrels were used for the shipment of Hilton apples and flour. It was stated that about 100 barrels of flour a day poured out of the grinders and filled up to two carloads departing the Hilton Train Depot, and transported all over the world.

In 1965 after 50 years of operation as the Hilton Milling and Warehouse the business was sold to Alfonso Gioia and Bros. On October 4, 1972, a disastrous fire leveled the lumber warehouse. Only the apple cold storage and the old brick chimney survived. Since the old chimney has been demolished, the cold storage building is the lone survivor of a once thriving operation.

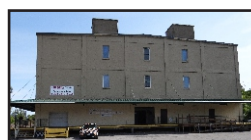

Recycle with Care

Five years ago Monroe County did away with separating paper, plastic, glass and metal materials in their recycling program and made a new policy accepting the mixture of all materials together in either blue or yellow bins.

Since the inception of recycling in the Village of Hilton, employees have been very dedicated to adhering to the county's policy and have worked diligently to keep garbage and other unacceptable materials out of recycling loads. The recycling transfer facility has been known to reject an entire load when such materials have been discovered. This can be costly in both time and money for a municipality. The Village of Hilton DPW has never had a load rejected due to the great care recycling crews have taken to keep unacceptable items from entering the recycling trucks.

Please be conscientious about what you place in your recycling box and try to be understanding when something is not accepted by the recycling handler. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated!

Acceptable materials are as follows:

Empty - Clean - Unbagged ...

- **Plastics** - bottles, jugs, jars, tubs, caps, spray pumps and lids. (**No coffee pods, utensils, cups, straws**).
- **Paper** - milk and juice cartons, drink boxes and soup boxes, pizza boxes and paper egg cartons. Clean, dry, office, computer and shredded paper, junk mail, cards, envelopes, brown bags. (**No paper toweling or soiled paper**).
- **Glass** - food and beverage bottles, jugs and jars. (**No ceramics, plate glass, auto glass, Pyrex, leaded glass, mirrors, flat glass, drinking glasses or light bulbs**).
- **Metal** - can lids, defaced license plates, pots, pans and aluminum foil-ware.
- **Cans** - food and beverage. (**No paint, pesticide or petroleum containers**).
- **Aerosols** - (**containers must be empty, No spray paint or pesticides**).
- **Books** - phone books and all soft cover books, magazines, catalogs, newspapers
- **Box board** - cereal, tissue, gift, shoe, detergent and cake boxes. (**Remove box liners and throw away**).
- **Tubes** - Paper toweling and toilet paper
- **Corrugated cardboard** - must be flattened and not exceed 2' x 4'.

Hilton Garden Club Celebrates 60 Years!

The Hilton Garden Club was formed in 1959 when the first meeting was held in the home of Eleanor Harradine on Burritt Road. Fourteen members attended and heard a program given by local florist, Willett Justice.

Through the years the club funded and worked on beautification projects in the Village of Hilton and the Town of Parma, including planting flower boxes on Main Street, donating cherry trees and planting bulbs at the new Town Hall, maintaining a small park on Underwood Avenue, cleaning out the Smith Family Cemetery on North Avenue, planting shrubs beneath the village signs, donating a tree for the West Avenue School and planting a memorial garden at the Parma Union Cemetery on Parma-Center Road. In 1964, the club started holding an annual Christmas Bazaar at the Marple Furniture Store on Canning Street - an annual event that ran for 16 years. Funds raised were donated to several charities and for community projects including a donation for 2 CPR mannequins to the Hilton Fire Department and a donation to the Village for Christmas decorations. The club also had a booth at the Hilton Apple Festival. In 1985, the club participated in the Hilton Centennial Celebration by making centennial wreaths, planting hanging baskets on Main Street and donating money for plantings at the gazebo.

Today the club continues to support community beautification by maintaining the garden around the sign in front of the Community Center and the planter box in front of the Parma Library. This year, the members will organize the planting of the flower boxes that line Main Street in the Village.

The Hilton Garden Club welcomes new members. Meetings are held the third Thursday from 7-9 pm at the Hilton Baptist Church, 50 Lake Avenue. For more information, call 392-8522.

The club's annual plant sale will be held on Saturday, May 18th in the Baptist Church parking lot from 9-12 pm. Proceeds from the sale help fund the club's civic beautification projects and monthly programs.

In recognition of their 60 years, the Hilton Garden Club will hold a celebration at the Community Center on Thursday, June 20 at 6:30 pm with the unveiling of their memorial plaque.

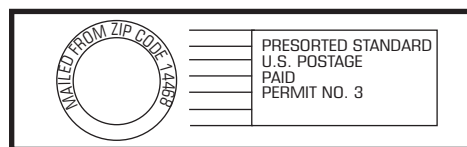
